It makes Zoe Howard think of older people. "In fact,


this year, 3rd graders dressed up as old ladies and old men!"

There were two assemblies during the day and a family fun event at night. They were both so much fun because everything we do at PS.185 is too much fun! Don't you think that? I do.


I hope you enjoyed learning all about the Brain Show – and I hope it was fun for you, even if you weren't picked. *****

CLIMATE CATASTROPHE

Have you ever heard of climate change? This article is about the horrors of climate change, how it affects our planet and how to help stop it. The definition of climate change is long-term shifts in temperatures and weather patterns. These shifts may be natural, but since the 1800s, human activities have been the main driver of climate change, primarily due to the burning of fossil fuels (like coal, oil, and gas) which produce heat-trapping gasses, according to the United Nations. If you want to learn all about this force that needs to be stopped, read on!

Climate change is very harmful. In fact, one-fourth of the U.S. population is vulnerable to this change of weather. Also, people suffering from heart problems are more vulnerable to increased temperatures, especially those living in already warm areas, as their cardiovascular systems must work harder to keep their body cool, according to the United Nations. On a positive note, many countries are starting to realize the grave consequences of climate change.

The 2015 temperatures continue a long-term warming trend, according to analyses by scientists at NASA's Goddard Institute for Space Studies (GISS) in New York (GISTEMP) .Global warming can result in droughts that can worsen living conditions, particularly in Africa, says the United Nations. Also, more ways that global warming affects us is that there are more hurricanes, diseases, crops have trouble growing and life expectancy drops. Here are the causes of climate change:

- GENERATING POWER
- * PRODUCING FOOD
- MANUFACTURING GOODS
- **POWERING BUILDINGS**
- ***** CUTTING DOWN FORESTS
- CONSUMING TOO MUCH

We humans aren't the only ones affected by climate change. Climate change has a big effect on the animals, too. According to the New England Aquarium in Boston, Mass., seals have to leave their pups for a longer amount of time to find fish because the fish can't live in cold waters. This could be a serious problem because seals have to leave their pups for up to seven days at a time to find food for their pups - and that's not good for the pups.

Some other animals that suffer include: polar bears because their home is melting; penguins because, again, their home is melting; arctic fox because their home has to be cold; and snow leopards need the cold because of their thick coats. As you can tell, animals are just as or even more affected by climate change.

Even though most animals are affected by climate change some animals make it worse. According to an article from Reuters, governments from New Zealand to Europe are zeroing in on livestock, whose burps and farts help generate 15 percent of global greenhouse gas emissions each year, the United Nations estimates show. 



Q: What are your strengths and weaknesses?




